

In the week tickets went on sale for John Lydon's return to Dundee with Public Image Ltd, memories have been stirred of the Caird Hall cancellation that will forever take its place in music folklore. The Sex Pistols - Anarchy In The U.K (official video) Share Watch on **YouTube**

The Caird Hall date became the gig that never was when Queen pulled out of making an appearance on Thames Today on December 1, which was the London evening TV show presented by Bill Grundy.

Lydon's Sex Pistols played Dundee's bowling alley in October 1976 as a young punk band

intent on shaking up the establishment just days after signing with EMI Records.

The band's first single Anarchy in the UK was due for release on November 26 and
