## Sex Pistols get their orders: No swearing in Leeds

Sex Pistols, the controversial new punk rock band, have been told to cut swearing from their concert at Leeds Polytech-

mic tonight.

This was revealed today by
Ian Steele, the Polytechnic Union's the president
for recreasion and one of
the concert organisers.

The concert has been given the go-shead despite widespread cancellations for their tour, "Anarchy in the U.K."

About 500 students and "townies" have bought tickets for the concert in the union assembly room.

Mr. Steele said: "We were told that the group's road manager has ordered the Pistois not to swear on stage.

"It seems to be an attempt to save the other concerns on tour while trying to preserve their image," he said. The group started a major uprear just week when they used foun-letter words on a television programme.

Mr. Chris Tipple,
Deputy Director of
Education for Leeds, said
the Education Department
and Dr. Patrick Nuttgens,
— the Leeds Polytechnic
Director — did not

propose to stop the group appearing. "What the Poly students' union does in the assembly hall is up to them providing there is no physical violence or damage to the building," he said.
