Woman dies in house blaze

A PENSIONER died today in a fire at her council-owned old people's bungalow.

She was found behind her bedroom door by neighbours, after the alarm was raised by a home help who called at the house this morning.

Mrs Evelyn Heatlie was on the floor only a few feet from her smouldering bed.

Mrs Heatlie is the mother of Coun Stan Heatlie of Sunderland.

Mr William Wilson, who lives opposite Mrs Heatlie in Hampstead Road, Sunderland, was one of the first on the scene.

"I heard someone shouting and when I looked out of my window I saw smoke billowing out of Mrs Heatlie's front door," said 63-year-old Mr Wilson.

"I ran across and found the home help in the house. She couldn't get the bedroom door open because Mrs Heatlie was behind it."

"I forced the door open enough for me to get into the room and drag her clear."

The bed was still smouldering although there were no flames. The house was full of thick smoke.

"Mr Wilson and other neighbours said Mrs Heatlie was a non-smoker and was an active woman often seen out on shopping trips."

Fights in street as strike fury boils over

0 held as police battle with pickets

TYNESIDE pickets were involved in a major clash with police outside a strike-hit London factory today.

More than 80 people were arrested by the coachload at the Grunwick Processing Laboratories in Willesden.

Members of Gateshead Trades Council were among the pickets as a handful of workers arrived for duty.

There were shouts of "scab" and "blackie". Then matters got out of hand. At one stage officers and pickets were wrestling on the ground.

Girls were in tears and four bombs were thrown at police. Several officers lost their helmets.

Within an hour three coachloads of people were arrested and at one point, other ran out of transport.

A picket said: "There aren't any more coaches. But a senior police officer wouldn't let us go. There will be."

Dismissal

Police said later they were going "hot" for the pickets in the charge room.

The Tyneside group was one of the first to take up picket duty early this morning.

North-East representatives of the Association of Professional, Executive, Clerical, and Computer Staff, the union involved in the row — were also at the scene.

The pickets were supporting an official strike by process workers which has entered its tenth month.

It is Britain's longest-running current dispute.

The strikers — mostly immigrants from East Africa — have been backed by TUC General Secretary Len Murray.

The trouble started as a walk-out over the dismissal of a worker. The firm alleged did not work hard enough. It quickly grew into a head-on clash between the company and union over the issue of union recognition.

The Advisory Arbitration and Conciliation Service recommended that the company should recognise the union but the management refused to do so.

The National Association for Freedom has also joined in the row, asserting that the fundamental point at stake concerns the freedom of an individual to decide whether to join a union or not.

The company has denied charges of racial discrimination and poor conditions.

This year's intensive picketing is expected to involve trade unions from various parts of Britain.

Three missing in air crash

THREE helicopters from the Sharks display team are believed to have crashed in mid-air today at Farnborough, between Brighton and Portsmouth.

The Royal Navy said two of them fell into the sea and three men had so far not been found.

The third helicopter made a crash landing in a field two miles from the collision.

Search and rescue helicopters from Culdroe, near Helston, have been sent to the scene.

According to first reports the accident happened during a practice work-up by the Coastal Helicopters, belonging to 705 Naval Air Squadron based at Culdroe.

A search was launched for the two helicopter pilots and one additional crew member by other helicopters and the local lifeboat.

James Earl Ray, convicted assassin of civil rights leader Martin Luther King, was recaptured today after his escape from jail in Tennessee on Friday.

Ray, jailed for 99 years after pleading guilty to shooting Dr. King in 1968, escaped over the prison wall with six other men. Five have now been recaptured.

Strummer (24), of Forest Hill, London, admitted taking pillows and a towel worth £28. He was fined £50.

Henson (22), of Pinbury Park, admitted taking a key and key ring worth £2 and was fined £40.
