Punks clash OVER 2000 punks clashed with police in London's Kings Road last Saturday after a protest over the

closure of the Beaufort Market as a "punk centre." The Clash were to have played a concert at the market but this was abandoned after the Metropolitan Police Special Patrol Group moved in to

break up fighting between punks and the police. 75 people were arrested after what was described as a pitched battle in which three policemen were

injured.

Mr McDonald, tireless in his campaign against injustice (and doubtless eager for publicity), was as equally determined that the punks should not surrender their bastion without a final display of disaffection. He therefore con-

trived a last stand on Saturday; the word went out that a clutch of bands, headlined by the Clash, would appear.

Bearing in mind that total fines are likely to run into four figures, and that some of the arrested kids will be hard-pushed for bail, McDonald has stated that a benefit concert is in the pipeline, and that The Clash have tentatively agreed to take part.
