The Clash: Political rock

MONTREAL (CP) — The Clash has been hammered by the critics, hounded by the authorities and racked by internal conflicts, but it's still playing rock 'n' roll, and lead singer Joe Strummer says the

music is better than ever.

"The New Wave is coming back to spit," said Strummer in a

telephone interview on the eve of the band's five-city Canadian tour, which begins in Toronto tonight and then heads to Montreal, Ottawa, Kitchener and Vancouver.

"We want to make music vital again. When we were growing up, music was everything. It was more than everything. Now it's just another consumer item. We want to restore all that."

The Clash is considered one of the two great bands that emerged from the British punk rock movement. The other, the Sex Pistols, lasted only nine months.

Since its last North American tour, The Clash has fired guitarist Mick Jones and acquired a new drummer and two new guitarists. But Strummer says the music is better than ever.


"Don't take my word for it; ask the audiences. We're more rocking; we're playing louder and faster."

The Clash formed in 1976 and immediately distinguished itself by preaching political engagement at a time when politics was virtually taboo among the young.

The music was so primitive and furious it made the Rolling Stones sound like Mantovani. The lyrics were equally extreme: "When they kick down your front door, how you gonna come? With your hands above your head or on the trigger of a gun?"

But Strummer says the song is about self-defence, not insurrection.

"I don't believe that an armed revolution is ever an actual revolution. The revolution is in our minds. We have never really

This is Bandana's première effort with producer Jim Ed Norman.

"Punk is not just a marketing trip; it is an attitude to life, an attitude that won't be fobbed off by excuses, that wants to see the reality behind the actions."

A punk band should be prepared to act as a midwife to ideas. "Yeah, a midwife to ideas. Sophocles said that."

The Clash plays Montreal on Wednesday, Ottawa on Thursday, Kitchener on Friday and Vancouver on May 31.
